The Central Utah Health Department announces that it will hold annual flu shot clinics in three locations in Sanpete County starting in early October. The locations and dates are as follows:

- October 3, 3-5 pm, Manti Fire Station
- October 9, 3-5 pm, Gunnison Fire Station
- October 10, 3-5 pm, Mt. Pleasant Fire Station

There is no cost with most insurances. If you don't have insurance, the cost is \$25. Cash, check, cards, and Health Savings Account payments will be accepted.

Adults and youth should wear a short-sleeved shirt to the clinic. Younger children should wear shorts.

DUP News and History by Cherrie Barrow Jones

The Canal Creek Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers lief Society engaged in the silkworm project, which was will have their first meeting of the year on Monday, September 9 in the ballroom of the Old School Community so please bring \$20. Anyone is welcome to attend our meetings. The lesson will be "The Tetons, Jackson Hole and Mormon Row" given by Jane Hawkes. A light luncheon will be provided. We look forward to seeing you there.

Fall is in the air, the seasons are changing, and the harvests are being stored. It is a good time to remember the remarkable history of the Relief Society in Spring City. The Relief Society Granary, located at 69 W 300 S, was established about 1870. (See photo below.) The stone granary and office were built as soon as possible after the resettlement of Spring City. After all the hard times the pioneers had gone through in settling this valley, they understood the principle of charity, of helping others in times of need. Fields were gleaned, wheat stored in the granary, and Sunday eggs were donated to help those who needed more food than they could produce for themselves.

The Relief Society women were able to achieve many worthy goals with limited resources. The Spring City Re-

started in 1855 by Brigham Young to create silk fabric for the pioneers' clothing. They also donated food for the Center at 11:00 a.m. We collect the yearly dues in the fall, workers building the Manti Temple, along with handmade articles and \$800 to finance the building. They donated \$3,681 for the Rock Chapel. After the Rock Chapel was finished, the Relief Society meetings were held in the old adobe meetinghouse that once stood south of the chapel on Main Street.

> The Relief Society's charity extended far beyond Utah. After the 1906 San Francisco earthquake, they sent money, along with contributions of quilts, food, soap and clothing to aid the victims. Then, during World War I, when farmers were getting a good price for their wheat, the Relief Society's stored wheat was sold to the federal government to help the military and those suffering from severe hunger in Europe.

The objective of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers is to perpetuate the names and achievements of the men, women and children who were the pioneers, preserving old landmarks and historical places, artifacts and histories that are important to the early history of the State of Deseret/Utah Territory. By reviewing the lives of the pioneers, we learn lessons of faith, courage, fortitude, and patriotism.
