Sanpete Sanitary Landfill Information by Chris Anderson

The operators of our sanitary landfills have asked that we ed for the type of waste delivered. share information about their operations so that we are all clear on how to make use of this resource. The Chester and White Hills landfills are operated through a cooperative agreement among the 13 cities and towns in Sanpete County and the County itself. This "Coop," as it is established, is not a taxing entity, and does not receive tax collected dollars. Rather, it operates solely on the fees paid for waste that is delivered, placed and compacted at the landfills.

Waste Delivered to the landfill is paid for by two different methods:

- Household (residential household 90 gal. cans picked up by a carrier). Fee is paid through our cities, a utility, or by the waste collection service provider.
- All other waste types which are delivered to the landfill from larger containers, whether by a contractor or carrier, and/or delivered by a citizen in a vehicle, pickup, trailer, or larger truck. This is paid for at the time it is delivered to the landfill or with an approved credit account at the current posted rate.

Payment for the household pickup service does not entitle ber that all loads must be secured. Cash payments are not any citizen, entity, contractor, or carrier to deliver any types of waste to the landfill without paying the fee post-

The cooperative board has in the past allowed our residents to waive tipping fees for the first 2,000 lbs. per month for yard cleanup. This benefit is not intended for any construction and demolition projects, insurance claims, or contractors, but is only for homeowners to clean up our yards. We have in the past recorded vehicle license plates as a method of tracking the delivery, but some have changed trucks and demanded a second amount. If we continue to have arguments with the scale house operators, we will look at alternate methods to track the deliveries. Other counties require that citizens prove residency and obtain a permit to allow free dumping.

The Coop is looking at several alternate methods to avoid abuse of the benefit in the future. Each landfill has rules regarding what types of waste are allowed, and those rules will be posted and can be obtained from the City, or by going to the Sanpete Sanitary Landfill Cooperative website, or by asking the scale house operators at each location. Different types of waste must be separated, as they may need to be dumped in different spots. Rememallowed at the landfill.

Christmas lights twinkling in the snow, lighting the eaves of houses and creating magical settings, are part of our holiday traditions. Electricity first came to Spring City in 1903. The Spring City Light and Milling Company installed the power plant in the same building as the Roller Mill, which was located by the canal on the east side of 500 East and 400 South. The water came from the canyon and ran a big water wheel, which generated power for both the flour mill and the power plant.

The City purchased twelve 32-candle-power lights, and the power poles were set right down the center of Main Street with the bulbs placed most favorably at the street crossings. The bulbs didn't give off much light, but everyone in town rushed down to Main Street to see the little glimmer come over the wires.

own house for a fee of 50 cents a month. The mill ran a few nights a week to provide power for certain activities. imperative that arrangements be made with the plant operator to be sure enough power was generated until the designated hour. One evening, folks forgot to tell the marshal, and the power plant was shut down at midnight, bringing an abrupt end to festivities! (Life Under the Horseshoe, p. 99)

The Mill eventually burned down. The main power switch—for the entire town—can be seen at the Old City Hall Museum on Main Street. As we compare our abundant electrical supply with that of times past, we realize how far we have come and are grateful. At this time of year, we particularly want to thank everyone who participates in decorating the light poles on Main Street to brighten up our winter season. Happy Holidays!
